How to get involved

Find out about training and apprenticeship opportunities nearby

- Once you've decided that becoming a Green Deal Installer would benefit your business, you will need to apply to a UKAS accredited Certification Body who will assess and certify you as fit to carry out Green Deal installations. The full list of certification bodies can be found on the [Green Deal Oversight and Registration Body](#) website, where you can search for an organisation that can accredit your particular trade or speciality.
- Depending on the measures you want to install, you will need to comply with one of the following two schemes:
 - Renewable technologies - [Microgeneration Certification Scheme \(MCS\)](#) installer requirements MCS 023 for relevant measures.
 - All other measures not covered by the MCS specification - [British Standards Institute](#) PAS 2030 available to buy as a digital document for £75.

Both the MCS 023 and PAS 2030 provide comprehensive guidance on the standards and requirements for installing measures available under the Green Deal scheme, and on the Quality Management System (QMS) that needs to be in place to support your business

- As soon as you are confident that you can meet the standards required, your chosen certification body will visit and carry out an office audit to discuss your QMS. They will also want to inspect a recent installation. The cost of this visit will vary between organisations, so it is worth your while shopping around.
- Once accredited, you can start carrying out Green Deal installations. Your certification body will register you with the Green Deal ORB website so customers can search for you online. You may find it useful to contact local Providers as they will have access to Green Deal clients. Remember that you will need to comply with the conditions detailed in the [Green Deal Code of Practice](#) and will be subject to regular monitoring to ensure continuing high standards.

Areas for consideration

If you are already an MCS Certified Installer you may not have to start the entire application from scratch. It's worth talking to your MCS certification body to find out if they can provide more information and guidance.

If you are Gas Safe registered you will still need to comply with the PAS 2030 requirements, however you can use your Gas Safe Registration to demonstrate compliance with the gas-safety specific requirements of PAS 2030 only.

Installers are only certified for the specific Green Deal measures they apply to install. You can be certified for as many measures as you wish providing you meet the specified standards set out in PAS 2030 or MCS 023.
